period he was writing editorials for Architectural Forum and Cue, and other publications. He was appointed to the State Planning Commission by Gov. Al Smith and was largely responsible for the improved Tenement House Code.

On returning from W.W.II, Leonard moved to the Virgin Islands where he served as an unpaid member of the Planning Board. Later he was appointed by the Governor of the Islands as the paid Director of the Board.

On Aug. 22, 1917 Leonard married Frances Montagu Ward at Darien, Conn. This marriage ended in divorce. On July 1, 1931 he married Sylvia Van Rensselaer. Leonard's hobbies were mostly boating, sailing and small boat designing and building. He also composed music.

It is sad that Leonard was with the Class such a short time and that distance precluded close touch with Classmates after college days. He was a rare combination of native intelligence, keen wit, inherited talent, physical heroism, and what his widow calls "really terrifying crudition." His most ambitious writing was on Medieval Geometry in Architecture, a book unfortunately not finished at the time of his sudden and fatal heart attack. It is expected that some of the chapters will appear in architectural magazines. Although not a close member of the Class, he brought color, flavor and distinction to the Class.

DERBY was born Nov. 22, 1890, in Jersey City. He prepared at Exeter. In Princeton: Freshman track team. He left college at end of freshman year.

W.W.I. National Guard service June-October, 1916. Recalled July 1917. Captain November 1917; various assignments in continental USA to date of discharge Dec. 1922. W.W.II. Active duty from April 1942. Major, intelligence officer with Air Corps at Washington to July 1943. Promoted to Lt. Col. June 14, 1943 and left for China-Burma-India theatre Oct. 1943; served as intelligence officer with Air Corps, to July 1944, when he returned to USA; released from active duty Dec. 1944; in addition to various campaign medals, awarded Asiatic-Pacific medal with one bronze star. Retired in 1949.

Manufacturing agent for Hy-Test Cement Company of Philadelphia for some time; salesman for building materials in Washington.

Married Crustal Kennedy of New York June 4, 1919. Even though we knew him only during his freshman year, he will be kindly remembered by many. His war record, especially W.W.II, was outstanding.
